The History of Early Los Angeles



King Carlos III established the Pueblo of Los Angeles in 1781. This statue stands in the plaza of the historic pueblo.

Our program for March, traces the history of Los Angeles from its founding as a pueblo of 44 people in 1781 through California's statehood in 1850. This program will also cover the factors that allowed the pueblo of 1500 people at the time of statehood to become the metropolis of over 4 million that Los Angeles is today.

Bruce Phillips, EdD, and Katy Phillips, MS will present this interesting program; both are native Californians and retired educators. Bruce has lived in Los Angeles County his entire life, while Katy grew up on a ranch in Imperial Valley. Bruce and Katy are members of Los Angelitas del Pueblo; a group of volunteers who lead tours of the historic El Pueblo de Los Angeles (Olvera Street is part of the pueblo). In its 50-year history, Las Angelitas del Pueblo has given tours to 900,000 people. Bruce is the Immediate Past-president, and Katy served on the board most recently as Director of Education.
